Collaboration

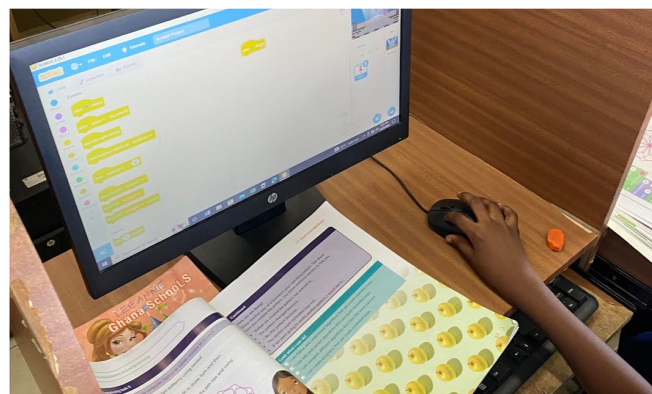
We accomplished more by working together as a learning community and with our stakeholders and partners. A key highlight was the 'Green Guardians Project', carried out in partnership with the Ghana Forestry Commission. Our learners were given real responsibilities at the nursery department and learnt about caring for plants, the importance of environmental conservation and teamwork.

Innovation

Each pupil was tasked to come up with innovative ideas to solve real-life problems. Congratulations to Grades 5 and 7 for their winning ideas, which respectively, were a self-sort bin that recycles waste and distributes them accordingly and harvesting energy generated by natural disasters for power for homes and industries.

Growth

Our learners in Kindergarten two upwards were allocated plots on the school farm and grew maize, beans, beetroots, okro amongst others. This exercise not only helped to develop their green thumbs but also taught them responsibility. Learners had the opportunity to prepare their plots, witness germination first-hand, remove weeds, harvest some produce, and enjoy the fruits of their labour.

They educated our learners on malaria prevention techniques as well as how to take and interpret malaria RDT tests. Culinary Masterclass

Learners in Grades 5 onwards spent two intense days at the Dainess Chef School learning to prepare local dishes and bake some of their favourite treats. At the end of the period, our learners had mastered yam with palava sauce, banku and okro stew, abooloo, rock buns, cupcakes and crepes. Needless to say, these lessons were thoroughly enjoyed! Seminar by the Forestry Commission

Our learners enjoyed an engaging and interactive educational session with representatives from the Forestry Commission. They explored the importance of wildlife conservation and environmental stewardship through fascinating hands-on activities, including examining animal bones and having the opportunity to safely observe and hold a live snake. The interactive session provided a unique learning experience that enriched their understanding of the natural world and fostered a greater appreciation for wildlife.

Catch Up Lessons This Vacation

From Monday 27th July, 2026 to Friday 21st August, 2026, there will be Catch Up Lessons for learners in Grade 1 upwards on the school premises from 8am to 2pm, Monday to Friday. These lessons will cover core subjects such as Mathematics, Science, Social Studies and English as well as others such as Creative Arts, Career Technology and French. Mobile Phones and Their Attendant Challenges

We have noted with concern that mobile phone usage at home appears to be negatively impacting some of our learners. Teachers have noted learners submitting AI generated answers for homework assignments. Parents of some learners have also reported them accessing and sharing inappropriate material, some of a violent or sexually explicit nature. While mobile phones may aid with research and the ease of communication, we ask that their use be strictly monitored or avoided altogether, if possible. As an alternative to engaging in online games and chat platforms, we recommend that learners be challenged to read books and engage in more intellectually stimulating or physically demanding activities, such as sports, puzzles, and board games. We hope to discuss this matter further at Parent-School conferences scheduled for Term 1 next academic year.

UNIFORM CODE AND DISCIPLINE

Adhering to the school's uniform code and rules, completing and submitting projects and homework on time are signs of a disciplined learner. It is our prayer that you will continue to support our scholars' academic and character development.
